The Special Education Foundation proudly celebrated its 40th anniversary during the 2024 fiscal year, a milestone that wouldn't have been possible without the unwavering support of our donors, friends, and partners throughout the St. Louis region. In the past year, we introduced new programs and hosted an exceptional new event spotlighting individuals transforming the lives of students with disabilities in St. Louis County.

Through our various programs, SEF positively impacted over 6,500 students who receive special education services in St. Louis County.

The new programs joining our toolkit of support for students were the Autism Independence Project and SEF Presents, part of our **Arts in the Classroom** initiative.

Through a generous grant from the Charles W. Frees & Jean H. Frees Foundation and in partnership with iSocial, the **Autism Independence Project** is a pilot project designed to help students with disabilities served by the Special School District improve their independence by increasing their social skills and expanding their meaningful life aspirations. The early feedback from our participants has been overwhelmingly positive, giving us hope for the future of this project.

A dedicated group of individuals provided financial support to SEF during the 2024 Give STL Day of philanthropy, allowing us to initiate our SEF Presents series of music, dance, and theater performances in Special School District schools. The performances inspired and delighted hundreds of students at Ackerman, Litzsinger, Neuwoehner, and Southview schools. For FY 2025, SEF has received additional funding from the Regional Arts Commission to expand these performances with new arts partners.

Another new initiative coming in 2025 is **The Mobility Project**, which will help promote and improve the students' independence and ability to interact with

their environment and peers for students with physical disabilities.

Elsewhere in this report, you will learn about the positive impact of all of SEF's programs on the thousands of students we serve, who range in age from 3 to 21.

SEF's events continued to raise funds and awareness for our work for students in St. Louis County. The 21st annual Dan McLaughlin Charity Golf Tournament and Auction had its second-best fundraising event in our history, raising more than \$334,000 in October 2023. Our new event, The Starfish Awards, was a unique way to recognize eight educators in St. Louis County, plus three community leaders, who have made significant contributions to the education of students with disabilities. This event, held at CITYPARK Stadium in June 2024, was an incredible evening that celebrated their achievements and the impact of their work.

We also want to express our sincere gratitude to the SEF Board of Directors for their exceptional leadership and our amazing staff for their commitment to our mission, which has made a profound difference in the lives of countless students.

Finally, we are grateful to our partners at the Special School District of St. Louis County for their unwavering dedication to helping students.

Thank you for supporting the kids and allowing SEF to help them in many ways.



### **WHO WE ARE**

Founded in 1984 as Missouri's first public school foundation, the Special Education Foundation (SEF) offers vital support and resources beyond what tax dollars provide to students served by the Special School District of St. Louis County (SSD).





### WHO WE SERVE

The Special School District of St. Louis County (SSD) is Missouri's largest specialized education provider, dedicated to equipping and empowering students of all learning abilities to reach their full potential. Serving children and youth with disabilities ages 3 to 21, SSD operates under the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) and tailors services to each student's Individualized Education Program (IEP). These services are offered in a range of placements across St. Louis County, from SSD teachers providing support in the student's home district to specialized SSD schools or private agencies. Currently, 99% of SSD students attend school in their local district.

SSD supports nearly 23,500 students with disabilities in its schools and classrooms across 22 districts, more than 1,600 students in career and technical education, and over 1,200 students attending private or parochial schools.

# Adaptive & Assistive Equipment

FILLING GAPS IN PERCEPTION, COMMUNICATION, AND VISION

Adaptive equipment and assistive technology play a crucial role in helping students with disabilities engage more fully in both academic and everyday life. Thanks to a generous grant from the Tilles Foundation, SEF is able to provide funding for specialized equipment to students served by the Special School District up to age 21.

SEF is dedicated to making a meaningful difference in the education and well-being of students facing financial challenges, with a focus on augmentative devices, adaptive equipment, hearing aids, eyeglasses, and other assistive technologies. Our mission is centered on fostering greater independence and enhancing the quality of life for the individuals we support.

SEF's Gift of Sound program provided hearing aids to over 68 students, while 12 students received adaptive or assistive equipment. These essential tools help students enhance their learning and foster independence both in and beyond the classroom.

# SEF Presents! Arts in the Classroom

BRINGING THEATER AND MUSIC ENRICHING EXPERIENCES INTO THE SCHOOL ENVIRONMENT

Theater and music programs can profoundly benefit students with disabilities, leading to increased self-esteem, enhanced social interactions, improved language skills, and a greater appreciation for the arts. Through participation in theater, music, and artistic expression, many students uncover hidden talents and skills.

At SEF, we recognize the essential role fine arts play in the education of students with disabilities. We are committed to providing artistic opportunities that foster growth and development through plays, musical troupes, or other creative experiences within their learning environments.

This year, SEF is partnering with the Repertory Theatre of St. Louis, the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra, Metro Theater Company, The Black Rep, Jazz St. Louis, and other organizations to bring more performances and programs into the SSD schools in the year ahead.

We've recently received a \$7,200 grant from the Regional Arts

Commission and 41 donors helped us to raise \$6,225 from the Give STL Day Campaign in May 2024.


# **Autism Independence Project**

IMPROVING INDEPENDENCE & INCREASING SOCIAL SKILLS

The Special Education Foundation (SEF) is a proud partner with iSocial in launching the Autism Independence Project. This initiative aligns with SEF's mission to empower students with disabilities served by the Special School District by enhancing their social skills and expanding their aspirations for independent, meaningful lives.

### What is iSocial?

iSocial is a remote group therapy program designed to build social competence, developed by Dr. Janine Stichter and her team at the Thompson Center for Autism at the University of Missouri. Its goal is to transform the lives of individuals with autism, enabling them to lead independent lives with fulfilling employment and strong friendships. The program offers group telehealth therapy for children and adults, helping them acquire crucial life skills.



"In past years, I would always avoid scheduling meetings for at least an hour after school because I knew I'd have to deal with some kind of episode or meltdown. This year has been completely different. I haven't had a single incident to manage. It's 1,000% better than before."

The calm start to the school year is something the parent credits entirely to the skills her daughter is learning through iSocial.

"Previously, my son couldn't sit in the classroom with his peers, preferring to stay outside. Now, he proudly sits in the classroom and even responds to some of his classmates' questions and comments. This change has made a world of difference in his daily experience at school."

# **Critical Needs**

### PROVIDING EVERYDAY ESSENTIALS FOR STUDENTS IN NEED

Students with disabilities often face financial or physical challenges that can disrupt their learning and hinder their ability to participate fully in the educational process. When essential needs go unmet, it can significantly impact their success in both the classroom and the community. To address these critical needs, SEF is dedicated to providing financial support.

In collaboration with SSD, we raise funds during the winter Coat Drive to ensure that students served by SSD are equipped with coats and winter accessories to stay warm during the colder months. Additionally, the program has helped provide food baskets for approximately 140 families during winter and spring breaks as well as the start of summer vacation.

In addition, students have received uniform clothing for professional appearances on job sites, graduation clothing to participate in end-of-the-year ceremonies, and personal care products funded during the Personal Hygiene drive in the spring.



# **Classroom Innovation Grants**

### SUPPORT FOR CREATIVITY TO ENHANCE STUDENT LEARNING

Teachers continually seek creative ways to enhance education for students with disabilities, often dipping into their own pockets to provide enriching learning experiences.

Since 2002, SEF has supported these efforts through its Classroom Innovation Grants program. This initiative is designed to empower teachers by providing the funding necessary to bring innovative classroom projects to life, enriching the educational experiences of students with disabilities.

Over the past year, SEF awarded \$53,598 to 89 teachers to bring their creative and impactful projects to life.



Rachel Blake, a teacher of the Vocational Skills Program, was awarded a Classroom Innovation Grant for her Smoothies for Wellness project. "The students learned skills related to employability skills for food preparation," stated Blake. "The deep freezer also provided opportunities for students to expand their smoothie menu to start having monthly featured recipes due to increased frozen food storage space. Through this process of expanding the menu, interns have had the opportunity to learn how to research recipes and make choices about the flavors they will offer on their menu. This ownership in their work has created a sense of belonging and encouraged and motivated students at the office."



Parkway teacher Amanda Howell's project involved her fifth-grade deaf and hard of hearing students for a dining experience at a local restaurant. Students were able to order lunch and a drink and dine with their peers. For a few students, this was their first time eating at a local restaurant. "In preparation for ordering lunch at a restaurant, students learned real-world communication strategies for individuals with hearing loss. Students were not allowed to use sign language interpreters for ordering lunch, but rather had to choose if they would use their voice or point to the menu. One student shared that they didn't know they could order for themselves! Students learned appropriate behaviors when eating at a restaurant (e.g. how to use a napkin, using utensils, throwing away trash). While I observed students showing they were nervous to order lunch, they were beaming with pride after they ordered and received their tray of food."

# Fred Saigh Leadership Academy

### CREATING LEADERSHIP OPPORTUNITIES FOR STUDENT SUCCESS

In 2004, SEF established the Fred Saigh Leadership Academy, made possible by a generous grant from the Saigh Foundation. This annual program is designed to develop leadership skills in students with disabilities, preparing them to take on meaningful roles in their schools and communities.

The Academy's curriculum is crafted to immerse students in real-world challenges and opportunities within the community. Through experiential learning, mentorship, and skill-building, participants gain valuable experience in running for school offices, managing school projects, and assuming leadership roles.

Each year, the class organizes a September car wash to raise funds for three chosen charities. Over the nine-month program, students visit key sites and meet with local leaders, including stops at the St. Louis County Executive's office, the George Westfall Criminal Justice Center, the Missouri State Capitol, and the Holocaust Museum.

15 students from across St. Louis County participated in the program during the 2023-2024 school year.

The program culminates in a graduation ceremony in May, where one student is honored with the C.J. Aubuchon Award for exemplifying kindness and inclusivity.

# John Cary Scholarships

PROPELLING STUDENTS TO FUTURE SUCCESS

The Special Education Foundation established the John Cary Scholarship in 2016 to honor the late John Cary, former Superintendent of the Special School District of St. Louis County (SSD), whose dedication to advocating for students with disabilities was unmatched.

This program awards annual college scholarships to deserving students beginning their post-secondary education. Recipients embody the qualities that John Cary valued most—resilience, courage, and determination. Scholarship candidates are evaluated based on their academic achievements, leadership skills, community involvement, accomplishments in athletics or the arts, and their potential for future success.

Each year, SEF awards a \$5,000 scholarship to five outstanding college-bound students and a \$2,500 scholarship from the Christopher Davis family to one Ritenour High School student.





### SHAYNEISHA ALLEN Parkway Central High School

Shayneisha is determined, driven, and focused on meeting her life goals. She has the courage to speak up, shows her authentic self, and supports others when it really matters. They provide valuable opportunities for students to interact with peers, build friendships, and develop relationships that enhance their self-confidence and independence.

The Special Education Foundation's Kid-to-Camp program supports families by offering camperships to students with disabilities. These camperships are awarded based on a thorough assessment of financial need and the potential benefits of the camp experience.




